# **Additional Context**

### 1. Northern Meadows:

• Species of conservation concern exist in this area (see Species at Risk Act consideration below under #4).

## 2. Ogilvie Mountains:

- Continue to allow access to existing claims via fly-in access or through the
  existing trail network. Allow the establishment of a winter road should a
  working mine be established, subject to appropriate environmental
  assessments.
- Species of conservation concern exist in this area (see Species at Risk Act consideration below under #4).

#### 3. Mountain Caribou:

- Allow the establishment of a winter road should a working mine be established, subject to appropriate environmental assessments.
- Species of conservation concern exist in this area (see Species at Risk Act consideration below under #4).
- Follow guidelines set out in Dawson Forest Management Plan (DFMP).

## 4. Additional policy considerations:

- Areas containing species of conservation concern listed under the Federal Species at Risk Act and any prescribed management directions (e.g., recovery strategies, management plans, etc.) should be followed.
- Where the DFMP applies, guidelines set out in the DFMP should be considered:
- The Parks and Land Certainty Act commits to protecting a representative area in each ecoregion;
- Class 3-5 agricultural land is limited in the region;
- Yukon has adopted an interim wetlands policy approach to that focuses on preserving fens and bogs which are the hardest wetlands to reclaim;
- River corridors are important for tourism and viewscapes;
- Yukon and TH have worked collaboratively on recovery planning, including range expansion in Yukon, for the Fortymile caribou herd.
- Disturbance thresholds are a tool to manage cumulative effects on working landscapes.
